**Keynote Speaker: Jose Ma. Lorenzo "Lory" Tan, CEO and Vice Chairman, WWF-Philippines**

**About the speaker:**

Aside from his duties with the World Wildlife Fund, Philippines, Lory Tan concurrently sits as Chairman and President of the **Philippine Tropical Forest Conservation Foundation**. He also serves on the **Technical Adviser's Group** of the Secretary of Agriculture. He is also an NGO member of the **Sulu Sulawesi Marine Ecoregion** Tri-National Committee, the PA Management Board of **Tubbataha Reef Natural Park**, and the Joint Management Committee of the **Turtle Islands Heritage Protected Area** that covers Malaysia and Philippines.

Within the Senior Executive Team of WWF's **Coral Triangle Network Initiative (CTI)** covering the Philippines, Indonesia, Malaysia, Timor Leste, Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands, Tan's work focuses in the areas of **Business & Industry** engagement, **Multi-lateral Development Banks, Government & Aid Agency** relationships as well as in the emerging field of **Public-Private partnerships**. He also sits as a member of the **National CTI Coordination Committee**. As Philippine CEO, Tan is actively involved in managing the partnership between WWF and the Asian Development Bank.

As a published author, two of Tan's books: [A Field Guide to Whales and Dolphins of the Philippines](#) and [The Last Great Forest](#) won **National Book Awards for Environment**. His Mabuhay Magazine article, won him a Philippine Kalakbay Award as **Travel Writer of the Year**. Tan is a PADI **dive master**, and a wildlife **photographer** with over a dozen book projects where he made lead contributions.
